THE GREAT DEBATE

All the world loves a debate. When two sides square off—across the family dinner table, at a staff meeting, or on the stage of presidential hopefuls—a thrill of tension ripples around the room. Who will get the better of the argument? Will truth win out over clever rhetoric? As a debate gets underway, some of us harden ourselves against all evidence in favor of a predetermined viewpoint. Others discover a new openness to the opposing perspective, and may change our minds or at least soften our hearts with greater understanding.

From the time Jesus arrives in Jerusalem, the debate regarding his authority is on. There's a tag-team approach to discrediting him. First the Pharisees and Herodians test him about taxes. They represent distinct perspectives: the Mosaic-law-toting Pharisees revile the tax, while the profiteering Herod party prefers to keep the *Pax Romana*. The debate leads to a draw. The response of Jesus baffles both sides.

Next up are the Sadducees. They come at Jesus about resurrection from the dead, a doctrine they reject. Jesus argues biblically for resurrection and raises them one better, casting angels into the ring. Sadducees don't buy angels either, but Pharisees support afterlife *and* spiritual beings. So while the Sadducees go off to sulk, the Pharisees return delighted. Jesus has divided his enemies and weakened the offensive, a classic military tactic!

The happy Pharisees now pose a more candid question: which is the highest law of all? Jesus proposes the love command, which incorporates both law and prophets. To argue against Jesus now would be to argue against their own platform. The Pharisees are trounced.

Jesus denounces both sides for a lack of sincerity. People of good will don't begin in the spirit of opposition. Those genuinely allied to the truth would listen to Jesus instead of setting traps for him in public contests. This sort of religious theater isn't what Jesus is about. There's a bigger stage he's yet to mount, from which he can be seen for centuries to come.

Not all of us belong on a debate team. We may personally shrink from verbal sparring and open conflict. But we're all involved in the greatest debate of history: for or against Jesus Christ. Every action we take testifies to one side or the other. Everything we value and everyone we choose to love (or hate) is another bit of evidence for our primary allegiance. On Priesthood Sunday, we acknowledge the person in our assembly who's taken a very visible stand in that debate. The priest's position doesn't co-opt all others. It invites all others! As we gather around the table, the role of the priest reminds us that our response to this sacrament is part of salvation history's great debate.
