CALL TO HOLINESS

The Lord God planted a garden in Eden, which is in the east, and there he put the man he had fashioned. From the soil the Lord God caused to grow every kind of tree, enticing to look at and good to eat. Are we caring for creation? Energy efficiency is a major concern for our society. It seems to be the hardest problem to find a solution for. What can we do as individuals. Walk small distances instead of driving. Use public transportation when possible. Use none motorized lawn mowers. Lower your thermostat. Do not let your car idle. Turn off lights when you leave the room. Try to be more efficient when using electrical appliances. Write down ways that you think are beneficial and share them with others. These may not seem to have much of an impact, but they will make us more aware and that is the first step to energy efficiency.
