The Exaltation of the Holy Cross – September 14

Every year on September 14, the Catholic Church celebrates the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross. At first glance, it may seem strange to exalt a symbol of suffering and death. After all, the Cross was the Roman Empire's method of executing criminals. Why would Christians celebrate it?

The reason is profound: through the Cross, Jesus Christ transformed suffering into redemption, death into life, and defeat into victory. What once symbolized shame and cruelty became the greatest sign of divine love and salvation.

This feast has deep historical roots going back to the 4th century. After Emperor Constantine legalized Christianity in the Roman Empire, his mother, St. Helena, made a pilgrimage to the Holy Land. Around the year 320 A.D., she is believed to have discovered the True Cross—the very wood on which Jesus was crucified—during excavations in Jerusalem.

In 335 A.D., the Church of the Holy Sepulchre was dedicated in Jerusalem on September 14, built over the believed site of both Calvary and the tomb of Christ. The annual celebration of the dedication soon became associated with honoring the Cross itself, giving rise to this liturgical feast.

Theologically, the feast is not about glorifying pain or death. Rather, it is about celebrating the victory of Christ over sin and death through His self-giving love. The Cross is the throne from which Jesus reigns, not in earthly power, but in sacrificial love. St. Paul expresses this beautifully: "the message of the Cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, bubt to us who are being saved, it is the power of God" (1 Corinthians 1: 18) To many in the ancient world, and even today, the Cross may seem like weakness or failure. But to the eyes of faith, it is a sign of divine strength and wisdom. Paul also writes: "He humbled himself, becoming obedient to death- even death on a cross. Therefore God highly exalted" (Philippians 2: 8-9) Christ's humiliation became His exaltation. By embracing the Cross in obedience and love, He overturned the curse of sin and opened the gates of heaven.

The Exaltation of the Holy Cross is not just a remembrance of an event in salvation history—it is an invitation. Jesus tells His followers: "if anyone wishes to come after me, he must deny himself, take up his cross daily, and follow me" (Luke 9: 23).

This feast reminds us that the Cross is part of every Christian life. Suffering, sacrifice, and self-denial are not meaningless; when united to Christ, they become redemptive. Every time we make the Sign of the Cross, we proclaim our identity in Christ and our hope in His resurrection. On this feast, the Church calls us to look not away from the Cross, but toward it—to see not only the pain, but the power; not only the death, but the love that gave us life.
